Dear St Nicholas of Myra Families,

This Sunday 29 November begins the season of Advent in the Catholic Church. Advent begins the Church's liturgical year and is a time of preparation for our hands, hearts and minds for the anniversary of Christ's birth on Christmas.

Each year in our church and school we use the symbol of the Advent wreath during this season. The use of the wreath and candles during Advent are a longstanding Catholic tradition that was originally adopted by Christians in the Middle Ages as part of their spiritual preparation for Christmas.

So what does the Advent Wreath symbolise?

- Leafy evergreens, signifying continuous life
- The circle of the wreath, which has no beginning or end, symbolises the eternity of God, the immortality of the soul and the everlasting life found in Christ
- Any pine cones, nuts, or seed pods used to decorate the wreath also symbolise life and resurrection
- The four candles (3 purple, 1 rose/pink) represent the four weeks of Advent
- The purple candles symbolise the prayer, penance and preparatory sacrifices and goods works
- The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, when the priest also wears rose vestments at Mass; Gaudete Sunday is the Sunday of rejoicing
- The light from the candles signifies Christ, the Light of the World
- A white candle placed in the middle of the wreath represents Christ and is lit on Christmas Eve

General News - Swim School

2020 Swim School

The school swimming program held at Nepean Aquatic Centre is taking place **next week (Term 4 - Week 8 - Monday 30/11/20 to Friday 04/12/20).** The program is run by fully trained instructors who are employed by Nepean Swim and Fitness.

During the program, students will be assessed in regards to their ability and placed into specific groups catering for their needs, with all lessons running for 60 minutes. Teachers will be attending and also offer supervision at the pool as well as organising students at school and on the return journey. Students will be travelling to and from the pool by bus and this is included in the cost of the program. Please find below an outline of departure and arrival times as well as what your child/children will be required to wear and bring to school each day.

Students are to wear their swimmers to school, with their school uniform over the top.

Students need to bring to school, in a separate bag; underwear to change into, a t-shirt to wear to the pool over swimmers, towel, goggles (if desired) and thongs (or the like) as footwear **must be worn** to the pool.

Students will change out of their wet swimmers and back into their underwear and school uniform upon returning to school.

Please note that a plastic bag is needed to place wet items. <u>Please ensure all items worn to school and brought in the bag are labelled</u> – including shoes, socks, underwear, towel and goggles. Sun block is not required as the centre is an indoor facility.

All students are required to dress and undress themselves so please practise and encourage independence at home. A reminder that due to the current COVID 19 restrictions in place, no parents will be permitted into the pool.

St Nicholas of Myra Feast Day 6 December

Saint Nicholas was a Christian Bishop who helped the needy. After his death, the legend of his gift-giving grew. Nicholas's reputation for generosity and kindness gave rise to legends of miracles he performed for the poor and unhappy.

To celebrate the Feast of St Nicholas on Monday 7 December the students are asked to come dressed in Christmas colours (red, green and white) and will be engaged in activities about St Nicholas on the day. As St Nicholas was a person who helped the needy we ask that each child brings a donation for the St Vincent De Paul Christmas hamper on this day. The donation could be from the list below or an item that is non perishable and would provide food or joy for a family in need this Christmas. *All donations are to be brought to school in a bag and placed at the drop off point outside the school office in the morning.*

Facts about St Nicholas

- St. Nicholas is the patron saint of children, sailors, merchants, thieves and pawnbrokers.
- He was of Greek descent and was born during the third century in the village of Patara. He lived most of his life in the nearby town of Myra (both of which were part Lycia, present-day Turkey).
- The name "Nicholas" means "people's victory" in Greek.
- He was often referred to as "boy bishop," becoming a bishop at the age of only 30 years.
- He was the Roman Catholic Bishop of Myra during a time when Christians were persecuted by the Romans.
- A pure liquid called the Manna of St. Nicholas has been known to flow from his bones since his death 17 centuries ago. The Manna is collected by a Dominican priest every 9 May to bless Christians.

School Report Terminology

Religious Education

As we have been involved in teaching the DRAFT New Curriculum some of the terms found in these Semester reports may be new. Take a moment to look at these terms below.

Flourishing - Human flourishing occurs when your actions reflect the person that you were born to be. In Christian terms, this is being the person that God made you to be.

Flourishing is a constant state of growing: reviewing and reacting to the world around you. This is not to be confused with wealth or 'happiness.' It requires you to be honest, self-aware, considerate and responsible for yourself.

Common Home - referring to our earth as a whole. This includes the natural environment as well as environments made by people such as the classroom, our home and various other community settings.

Ways of Knowing - Epistemology- How do you know? It is the study of how we know and assess claims and competing claims for truth. The 'Ways of Knowing' studied include reason, empiricism, emotivism, intuition and experience.

English Terminology

Students use comprehension strategies to build literal and inferential meaning from texts.

Literal - referring to the way that students comprehend a text using literal meaning of the text or concepts within the text to their understanding.

Inferential - referring the information within the text that may not be directly stated. Students may use knowledge of the topic, images within the text, or connections between other texts to make inferences about the text.

Structure - referring to the way students compose writing texts. This includes text structures like paragraphing, headings and subheadings and cohesion between sentences and ideas. It also refers to students' knowledge that there are many different types of structures to suit different genres of writing.

Sentences Types - refers to the sentence structure used in writing.

Simple sentence - refers to a sentence which includes a subject and a verb.

For example: It was raining.

Compound Sentence - refers to a sentence with two or more independent clauses joining by a coordinating conjunction.

For example: It was raining so I took my umbrella.

Complex Sentence - refers to a sentence that has one or more independent clause and one or more dependent clauses joined together by a conjunction.

For example: As it was raining, I took my umbrella.

School Report Terminology

Mathematics Terminology

Working Mathematically

Working Mathematically is integral to the learning process in Mathematics. It provides students with the opportunity to engage in genuine Mathematical activity and develop the skills to become flexible, critical and creative users of Mathematics.

Working Mathematically involves six key skills students develop when working in the three main strands of Mathematics;

Fluency

Fluency is the recall of factual knowledge and concepts. It is also the ability to select and apply appropriate procedures to solve problems accurately and efficiently.

Communicating

Communicating is being able to describe, represent, express and explain mathematical situations, concepts, methods and solutions. Students can communicate using oral language, notation or diagrams.

Understanding

Students show understanding when they make connections between experiences and related concepts, and progressively expand and develop their ideas.

Reasoning

Reasoning is the ability to analyse, evaluate, explain, infer, generalise, deduce and reach conclusions.

Justification

Students justify strategies and use strategic thinking to draw conclusions and explain the reasonableness of findings, providing results where appropriate.


Problem Solving


Problem solving is where students interpret, formulate, investigate, model and solve mathematical problems in familiar and unfamiliar situations.


Learning
