Dear St Nicholas of Myra Families,

Last week, we feasted on pancakes for Shrove Tuesday and then commemorated the beginning of the Lenten season with Ash Wednesday. As we have entered into the first week of Lent, Project Compassion is challenging us to BE MORE.....

How can we BE MORE...?

-more prayerful....?
-more giving (not just of money but time, effort, positivity)?
-more kind....?
- more forgiving...?
-more helpful (without being asked)...?
-more willing...?
-more green...(eco friendly)..?
-more involved....?
-more aware....?

Here are some different ways to BE MORE or FAST - hopefully you can try one or two and see if it makes a difference to your lives and the lives of others around you.

BE MORE CONTEMPLATIVE (Fast from Noise) - How often do we have background noise accompanying us? We hear it as we drive, maybe while doing housework, even at the shopping centre. Silence can be a rare gift, and in the silence we can open ourselves up to God's words to us.

BE MORE EMPATHETIC (Fast from Gossip) - Pope Francis was quoted as saying "It is so rotten, gossip. At the beginning it is like candy. But at the end, it fills the heart with bitterness." These days, with social media, harmful gossip and bullying can go viral in minutes. Think about how you would feel if you knew people were talking about you or your child the way you may have at a social gathering or online. When we fast from gossip, we can focus on our own words and try to ensure they are kind, loving and empathetic.

BE MORE and have a go! (Fast from Excuses) - There is a saying: excuses are like belly buttons - everyone has one! Excuses hold us back from taking risks and growing as a person. It's okay to have a go and mess up. Remember the scripture "With God, all things are possible." (Mt 19:26)

This Lent, let us consider how we can 'BE MORE' for our neighbours around the world.

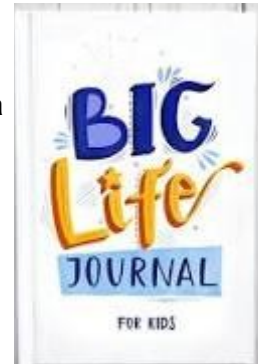

This text is from the Big Life Journal which offers practical ways in which to support your child when they say they are bad at things.

Alexandra the Chief Creator of Big Life Journal shares her reflections. "When I was a child, I could never say I'm bad at Math." My parents would quickly say, "Don't say that !" or "No, you're not!"

They meant well but I remember feeling so bad about this - like I did something wrong. Every time my body would tense up, blood would rush to my face. I'd feel guilty and unheard. But most of all - it didn't change the way I felt. I still felt bad at math. Simply saying "Don't say that," or "You're not stupid!" only dismisses the child feeling.



It really matters how we respond to our child's negative self-talk. But the problem is it's often hard to know exactly what to say at the moment.

Here are some ideas you can try:

**WHEN YOUR CHILD SAYS
"I'M BAD AT THIS!"**

INSTEAD OF:	TRY:
Don't say that!	Tell me what makes you feel that way.
I'm bad at this, too. It's just not our thing.	Just because it's hard doesn't mean you can't be good at it. Let's look at this together.
I don't want to ever hear this again.	Is that really what you're thinking or are you just tired right now?
Don't worry. You'll learn this in no time!	Sometimes we need to give our brains time to learn.

Religious Education

What are we Learning in Religious Education?

Religious Education in the Diocese of Parramatta has undergone much change in the last two years. This year, using experiential learning through student inquiry, students will engage with one Learning Cycle (unit of work) from the Draft New Curriculum each term.

Early Stage 1 - "Who is my Friend?"

Students in Early Stage One are new to school and forming new friendships. Students wonder about Jesus' friendships. They are learning about the person of Jesus and what it means to develop a friendship with Him.

Stage 1 - "How can I show love towards my neighbour?"

In this unit students will explore how we can follow the example of Jesus by showing love and care for our neighbour in words and actions.

Stage 2 - "Why do people sometimes do the wrong thing?"

In this unit, students will be exploring why people sometimes do the wrong thing. The unit will provide students with an opportunity to understand the teachings of Sacred Scripture and Tradition on an informed conscience, appreciate our words and actions that have consequences in our daily life and understand how to live their life through the lens of an informed conscience.

Stage 3 - "What does it mean for humans to think about their thinking?"

In this unit students will be introduced to philosophy, where they will begin to explore the importance of philosophy for truth seeking, and decision making. Students will begin to make meaning between Sacred Scripture, philosophy and daily life, as well as begin to construct a personal philosophy for decision making and being responsible for care of self and others.

Catholic Schools Week

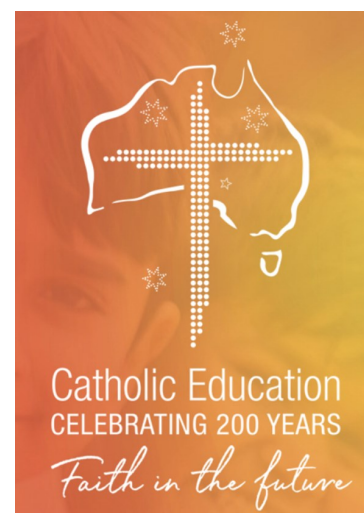
The theme for 2021 is 'Celebrating 200 years of Catholic Education'.

Throwback Thursday

Over the year the Mission Team will be investigating, interviewing and adding historical information to the newsletter as we celebrate 200 years of Catholic Education. This week Leo and Amisha from Year 5 interviewed Mr Simpson who attended St Nicholas of Myra as a student.

Interview with Mr Simpson

What is your connection to St Nicholas of Myra Primary School? I attended St Nicholas from Kindergarten to Year 6. My family and I were part of sporting teams and learning teams.

What was your favourite subject and why? I liked H.S.I.E /History and Geography because we learnt about the Gold Rush and we did lots of projects about it and I really enjoyed that kind of learning.

What was a characteristic of your favourite teacher? The best characteristics of my teacher was they were a little funny but really strict.

What is your favourite memory of St Nicholas of Myra? The playground although it looks very different now because in front of the church was a concrete playground which we played on.

What games did you play on the playground? I used to play bullrush and we were allowed to run on the concrete. A couple of days a week we got to go down to the infants playground (which is now our normal playground) but it was all grass. It had play equipment like monkey bars and slides. We generally played soccer when we were on the grass.

What excursions did you go on? We went to Featherdale one year I was here. Probably my favourite one was when we went to Bathurst and learnt about the Gold Rush although I did not find any gold.

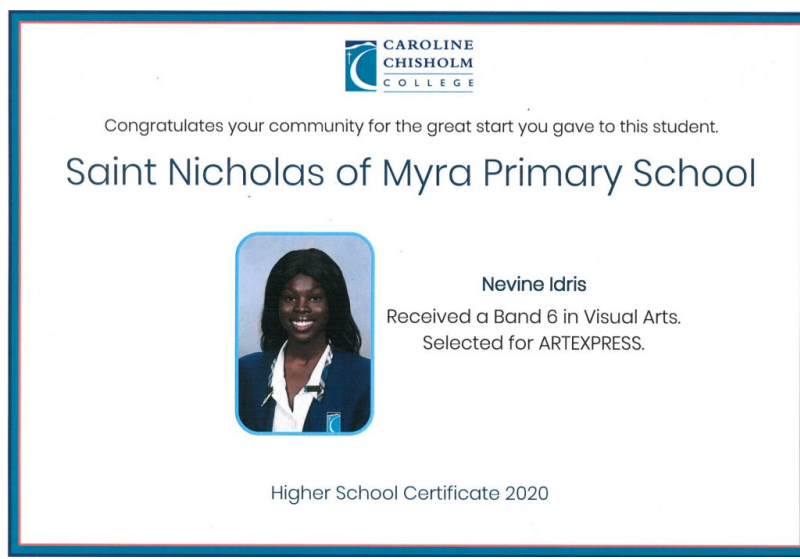
What kind of technology did you have at school? We had great technology at school they were called encyclopaedias (so they were books that you opened and they had lots of information in them). We had pencils and rulers but not much else so we had no technology.

How has the school changed? It has changed quite a lot over the years. The building that I'm sitting in now (Stage 3 classroom) used to be a single story building. It just used to be Stage 1 and Kindy. The playground was big with a lot of grass and Year 5 and 6 rooms were over in the old Parish buildings across the road. The office was up in the music studio. We didn't have a hall back then and the canteen was up in the primary playground where the Parish now sells religious items after church. The dungeon was really scary until you got to about Year 6 because every year, Year 6 used to have a fete and would put black curtains all over the windows and they used to dress up as monsters. People paid \$0.50 just to go down there and the Year 6 students used to scare them. It was kind of like a haunted house but you weren't allowed down there during school time. The only reason you could go down there is because of the school fete. Everyone lined up near the church and the infants used to have to walk all the way down here (current school) to get to their learning everyday. The school fete was on every year and I had so much fun. I had so much fun at St Nicholas being a student that I decided to come back and be a teacher at the school.

First Week of Lent (school week beginning Monday 22 February)

We begin our annual Lenten Project Compassion journey by learning about the story of Jamila and her family. Jamila, 22, is a Rohingya woman, living in the world's largest refugee camp in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh. A single mother, she fled armed conflict in Myanmar to save herself, her elderly mother and eight-month-old baby.

With the support of Caritas Australia, through Caritas Bangladesh, Jamila was able to access emergency food and shelter. She also received counselling, emotional support and learnt sewing skills, to help her earn an income. Jamila now feels less alone, with a sense of community around her. She is able to 'Be More' to her little family.

Shrove Tuesday

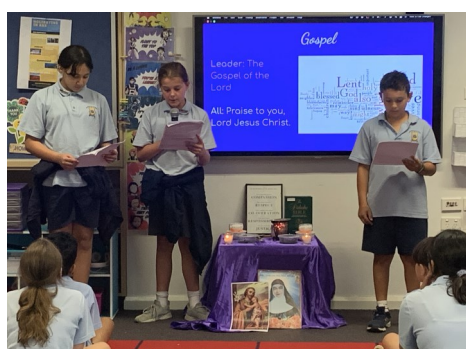

General News

2022 Kindergarten Enrolments and Catholic Schools Week Twilight Tours

Each year in Catholic Schools Week (CSW), we hold two twilight tours one at 4 pm and the other at 6 pm. This year it will be held on **Monday 1 March 2021.**

COVID practices will be put in place and we recommend the wearing of masks during this tour. This will allow the Principal and Assistant Principal to be protected and speak without a mask making it easier for you to hear our tour. However, depending on the numbers of mask wearers we may still opt to wear one as we also have families to keep safe and protect. Of course social distancing is required.

Each person will be required to sign in and we are limited to a size of 30 people. You will be required to register via a QR code. If you are unwell or have any symptoms we ask you to keep everyone safe by refraining from attending.

We accept enrolment applications at any time.

However it is after our Twilight Tours, when we begin making appointments for the 2022 Kindergarten Enrolment Interviews. The School Enrolment Officer will contact you to make an interview time with one or both parents and the enrolling child attends. COVID check ins and practices are in place. Again if you would like to wear a mask during this enrolment interview that would be preferable.

Current St Nicholas of Myra families who have a child commencing school in 2022 are encouraged to complete an enrolment form as soon as possible to avoid disappointment.

Attendance and H.E.R.O Awards

School attendance plays a critical role in enhancing the lives of students in schools. Every day of attendance adds to a student's achievement and success at school. There continues to be a focus on attendance across the Diocese. We aim to raise awareness about the importance of attendance and to promote a healthy attendance culture. We are aiming for an above *90% attendance rate*.



St Nicholas Attendance H.E.R.O awards will continue in 2021. H.E.R.O stands for Here Everyday, Ready On time. Students will be recognised twice a term for perfect attendance (no partial or full absences). For example, in a ten week term, students will receive an award if they have 100% attendance in weeks 1-5 and weeks 6-10. These students will also be acknowledged in Newsletters.

We realise some absences are unavoidable due to health problems or other circumstances. It is for this reason that we have made the Attendance H.E.R.O awards to recognise attendance for half of the term, rather than based on the attendance of a whole term.

Student Led Conferences

Thank you to the parents/carers for your partnership and active engagement in your child's learning this week. Thank you to the students for preparing and leading these learning conferences with your teachers and parents.

Term 1 A Disco - A - Day Fundraiser

After consultation with the Parent Chairperson, we have come up with an alternative for a disco which is COVID safe. As we consistently aim to reduce co-mingling between stages, we have decided to do "A Disco - A - Day" during Catholic Schools Week. The cost is \$5 for entry into the hall, a zooper dooper and pkt of baked sea-salt chips. The students who do not wish to participate are on the playground as usual in full school uniform. Please ask your child if they would like to attend this fundraiser in school; they will eat their lunch/ fruit break as usual and then those students who have paid will be walked to the hall for their disco. There will be teacher supervision during this event however if your child wants to leave the disco they will be able to do so. We will be having a disco photo booth as well.

Pre-payment was required via the **QKr! App by 11am Wednesday 24 February** and is taken as the parent's permission for their child to enter the disco. No entries can be taken after this deadline.

Learning

PBS4L Playground Initiative

PBS4L is Positive Behaviour Support for Learning. It is a school wide positive behaviour support approach that aims to develop both social and learning outcomes. It supports teaching school expectations in which students strive to "Be Safe," "Be Respectful" and "Be a Learner."



At lunch and fruit break, students receive a token when they are seen to be following playground expectations. Students place the token into their stage box outside of the office. When receiving a token, teachers will name the observable behaviour. Some of these observable expectations may include;

- here is your token for being safe when you were walking on the concrete
- you were being respectful when you took your turn to be out
- you were being a learner when you asked about the rules before playing
- you were being respectful when you included Jon into the game
- you were being respectful when you handed the ball back
- you were being respectful when you put your rubbish in the bin



Each fortnight there is a new playground initiative. The initiative encourages students to be safe and respectful on the playground by following a focus expectation. Students receive a double points token from teachers on duty when they are seen to be following the expectation.

This fortnight, Weeks 5-6, the PBS4L playground initiative is: **I can play the correct game in the correct area.** The stage with the most tokens at the end of week 6 will receive reward time towards an activity of their choosing for their stage.

Congratulations to **Stage 2** who were the winners for the Week 1- 4 round of the playground initiative! The students in Stage 2 will vote for a game within their class group for their reward time.

Buddy Bench

This week students are participating in a PBS4L lesson with their stages about our new Buddy Bench.

What is a Buddy Bench?

A Buddy Bench is our yellow seat in the playground that students can go and sit at when they find that they don't have someone to play with. This seat is located in front of the old kindergarten classroom. The purpose of the Buddy Bench is to support all students in feeling connected with their peers when in the playground. During the lesson, students will discuss the expectations when using the Buddy Bench as well as when they see a person sitting on the bench. Thank you to students in the SRC who have filmed a role play about using the Buddy Bench as a resource for these lessons. We look forward to sharing what the students have learnt from these lessons!

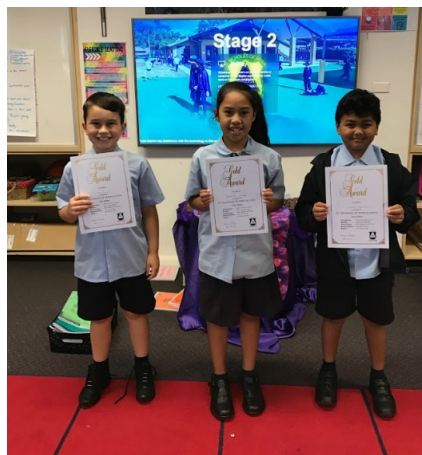
