Parish Mass

Students in Stage 2 will be attending Parish Mass tomorrow 12 March at 12:10pm. We are delighted that we are able to begin attending Parish Mass again in line with the Covid-19 regulations. Students will be seated in a reserved section in the Church. They will not move around during the Mass and if receiving communion the minister will come to them as is happening in all Parish Masses. Teachers will sign the students in to the Church at the beginning of Mass. If you would like your child to wear a mask they are welcome to bring one from home to wear to the Church.

General News

Attendance - Punctuality

Regular and punctual attendance at school is essential to assist children to establish positive attendance habits. Schools, in partnership with parents, are responsible for promoting the regular attendance of students.



The school day commences at 9am at St Nicholas of Myra. The morning music begins at 8:57am and concludes with the bell at 9am. We have a short assembly on Monday morning for the whole school prayer and national anthem. The rest of the week, students are entering their classrooms and beginning their learning at 9am.

Arriving at school before the bell allows students to experience positive interactions with their peers through play in the morning and develop morning routines which can reduce the anxiety of coming to school for some students.

Arriving late means that students are missing part of their literacy block, instructions have not been heard and routines have not been set in motion. As a consequence, students can find themselves taking longer to settle into their learning.

Please ensure that students are on time at school every day. Should unforeseen circumstances prevent you from arriving on time, please ensure that children are signed in at the office by an adult.

NAPLAN Online

The **NAPLAN Online test** window is nine days. Day 1 is a Tuesday and Day 9 is the Friday of the following week. The writing test must be scheduled within a two-day test window and schools must schedule writing from the first day of the appropriate two-day test window. For Year 5, the writing window is day 1 and 2. The tests need to be taken in a **specific order**. Individual students are not permitted to sit the online tests after Day 9. Celebrating 200 Years of Catholic Education

On Friday 5 March the students gathered together in the school playground for a liturgy celebrating 200 years of Catholic Education which was the theme of Catholic Schools Week in 2021. All families received a prayer card with the national prayer printed on the back on the day. We will continue to celebrate 200 Years of Catholic Education throughout the year.

Our theme this year is ‘Together We Grow’. As a Catholic School community it is important that we always help others and show kindness to all those we meet so that together we learn and grow each day.

At our Liturgy we unveiled a new painting that will be hung in our foyer to commemorate all those who were at St Nicholas during 2021.

All students added to the painting using their fingerprints to show the uniqueness we all bring to our school community and that when we all work together we can grow just like a tree.



Sacrament of Reconciliation

On March 25 students from Year 3 and 4 will make their Sacrament of Reconciliation. Reconciliation (officially called the Sacrament of Penance, and also known as Confession) is a Sacrament instituted by Jesus Christ in His love and mercy to offer us forgiveness for the times we have sinned and turned away from God. At the same time, we are reconciled with the Church because it is also wounded by our sins.

Every time we sin, we hurt ourselves, other people and God. In Reconciliation, we acknowledge our sins before God and the Church. We express our sorrow in a meaningful way, receive the forgiveness of Christ and His Church, make reparation for what we have done, and resolve to do better in the future.

PROJECT COMPASSION

Third Week of Lent (school week beginning 8 March)

We are now in the third week of Lent with the Project Compassion story of Oliva, a 22-year-old woman from Tanzania. She did not have the opportunity to go to school and was embarrassed that she was unable to read, write or count. As an adult, her business was losing money because she couldn't add up her money and give the right change to customers.

Then Oliva enrolled in Caritas Australia's literacy and numeracy classes. She also set up a home classroom to teach her neighbours, for free, because they were too shy to attend larger classes.

Oliva has now graduated, attendance at her classes are growing, her kiosk is thriving and she is helping her children with their homework. She aims to become a pastor and run for leadership in the next local election - to help her community to 'Be More.'

Fourth Week of Lent (school week beginning 15 March)

Arsad, an Indonesian farmer, had no toilet in his house, so always had to walk into the forest to the open defecation area. His family was often sick and open defecation caused many neighbourhood disputes. With the support of Caritas Australia and its partner agency, Laz Harfa, Arsad took part in hygiene, sanitation and financial management training. He then funded the building of a toilet in his house and helped other community members to save money to construct their own toilet.

Now, Arsad's family is healthier, their community no longer practices open defecation and is more harmonious. Arsad inspired his community to 'Be More.'

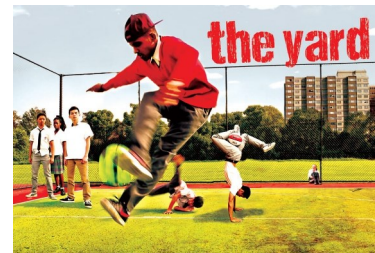

The Yard Performance

On the morning of Tuesday 16 March 2021, the students will be watching a performance from Shaun Parker & Company called 'The Yard'.

'The Yard' is an award-winning anti-bullying program that was created to address the issues of bullying, social exclusion and peer pressure in Australian schools. The Yard investigates themes using storytelling, contemporary street dance languages, sporting skills, parkour and acrobatics that children strongly identify with.



Buddy Bench Lessons

All stages have now completed a PBS4L lesson about the Buddy Bench. Below are some student reflections about what they have learnt and what they think about the Buddy Bench:

Kindergarten

Lyla: I liked that I had a kind heart and asked my friend if he wanted to play. I learned that when you don't have a friend to play with, you can sit on the buddy bench.

Stage 1

Chris: I learnt that we can sit on the Buddy Bench when we don't have a friend to play with. It is the yellow bench in the playground.

Michael: I liked that we practiced what using the Buddy Bench looks like in a role play.

Stage 2

Molly: I like that anyone can go and sit at the buddy bench. You can use it as a space to sit and think and join in a game when you feel ready.

Ella: I like that the buddy bench gives us an opportunity to play with people that we haven't played with before. I learned that I can go to the buddy bench when I feel lonely.

Stage 3

Billy: I like that it let's me see when other people don't have anyone to play with and this gives me the chance to approach them and make them feel included in my game which makes them feel happy.

Jeremy: I like how not only is the buddy bench a place for me to make friends, but it's also a place for me to calm down and take time for myself or to talk to other people.

PBS4L Playground Initiative

Through Weeks 7-10, the PBS4L playground initiative is: I am respectful when I listen to a teachers instruction the first time. The stage with the most tokens at the end of week 7 and 10 will receive reward time towards an activity of their choosing for their stage.



Evacuation Procedures - Safety

ACTION
1. For the least allergic: Stop eating/drink if possible. Do not remove teeth.
2. Take orally given oral antihistamine for hives.
3. Consider EpiPen® or EpiPen® Jr.
4. Give other medications (if prescribed).
5. Drink.
6. Return to hospital emergency department.

Wait for 30-60 minutes. If symptoms persist or worsen, call 000 or go to hospital.

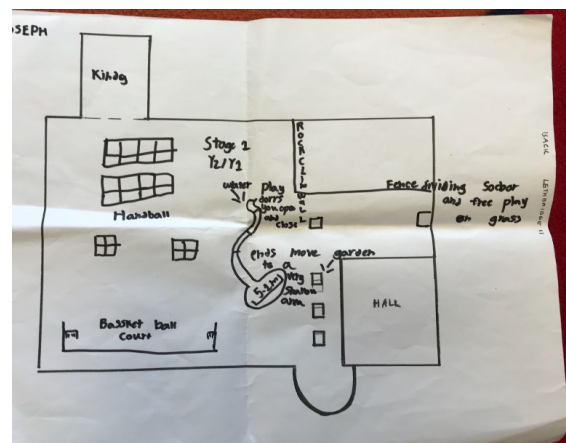
ANAPHYLAXIS (SEVERE ALLERGIC REACTION)
• Difficulty breathing
• Swelling of tongue
• Swelling of throat
• Difficulty swallowing or food
• Wheezing or coughing
• Dizziness or fainting
• Loss of consciousness

ACTION
1. Lay person flat. Do not allow them to stand or walk.
2. Give EpiPen® or EpiPen® Jr.
3. Phone ambulance (000) (RQ, 111 (NZ), 112 (Ireland))
4. Phone family/emergency contact.
5. Further adrenaline doses may be given if no response after 5 minutes (if another adrenaline autoinjector is available).
6. If in doubt, give adrenaline autoinjector.

• Give oral antihistamine if available.
• Give oral corticosteroid if available.

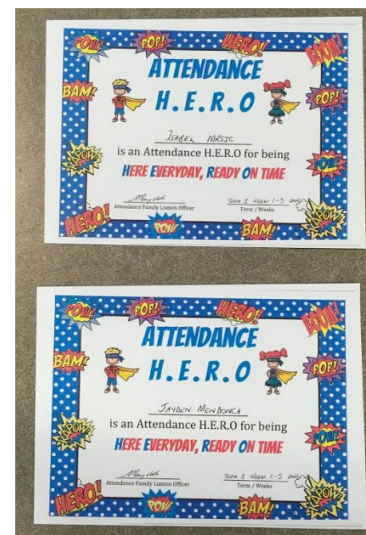

It has come to our attention that the procedures around dropping of and collecting of children from the 'Kiss and Drive' zone are not being adhered to and are causing some concern in relation to the safety and convenience of our children and families as well as the residents of Higgins Street.

Essentially, the 'Kiss and Drive' zone allows for only a two minute period where a vehicle can be stationary and children may be dropped off or picked up (according to school procedure). The driver **MUST NOT** leave the vehicle. Some people have been parking in the zone for much greater length of time and getting out of their vehicles to walk children to the entrance gates in the morning. This is inconvenient for other drivers.

We are very fortunate to have a well developed 'Kiss and Drive' zone that operates smoothly when all concerned follow correct procedure.
