Holiday - learning at home: Many parents often ask how they can support or help their child(ren) at home and during the school holidays with their learning?

The best learning you can do with your child at home during the holidays is to read, read and read with them. Take them to Penrith

library, enjoy reading stories throughout the day, read and view stories online via Storybox or PM online. Reading builds your child's imagination, general knowledge about a wide range of topics, vocabulary and spelling. Skills everyone relies upon when learning!

Another great idea for the holiday break is to play board or card games as a family such as snap, go fish, snakes and ladders, scrabble, trivial pursuit, etc. Playing such games builds your child's number sense which can help their Maths skills in the classroom.
